



1963 - 1965

June 18, 1963

- ♦ General Fund balance: \$7.10

August 5, 1963

- ♦ "Homecoming" will be held for all freeholders (citizens) for the purpose of everyone getting acquainted. Fish supper funded by \$10.00 from each Council member.

October 7, 1963

- ♦ Council hires Mr. Eure as Town Attorney.

November 8, 1963

- ♦ Council meetings changed to first Wednesday of each month.
- ♦ Banned hunting and discharging firearms within city limits except on marshland on south side of waterway.

December 4, 1963

- ♦ Council meetings changed back to Mondays.

January 6, 1964

- ♦ \$9.79 bill paid to Carolina Printing & Stamp Company for Town seal.

March 2, 1964

- ♦ Mannon C. Gore resigns as Mayor and commissioner.

March 9, 1964

- ♦ Special meeting: Edward K. Proctor elected Mayor; Paul Brummett appointed commissioner.

January 11, 1965

- ♦ Building permit fee adopted: \$5.00 for a cottage or business.
- ♦ Council decrees that taxes should not exceed 10¢ per \$100 of valuation and provide as many of the following services as possible:
 - Town Clerk and Treasurer salary: \$50.00
 - Street lights (no amount stated)
 - Part-time police: \$125 for five months of the year.

March 2, 1965

- ♦ Treasurer's report: General Fund balance: \$7.10; Taxes collected: \$499.70

March 11, 1965

- ♦ Council increases taxes to 20¢ per \$100.
- ♦ Discharges Attorney Eure; hires S. B. Frink as new attorney at no cost to Town.
- ♦ Mayor Simmons is asked to resign; he walks out of the meeting, which is then adjourned due to lack of a quorum.

April 5, 1965

- ♦ Request to Atlantic Membership Corporation for a phone booth in Town.

May 31, 1965

- ♦ Building permit fee increases from \$5 to \$10.



1965 - 1967

June 7, 1965

- ◆ Council members donate trashcans so pick-ups can begin.
- ◆ Trash pick-ups: Monday & Friday; Vander Smith and Ed Gore will be responsible for pick-ups and will be paid when the Town has the funds.

June 11, 1965

- ◆ Marvin Gray appointed to be a policeman.

November 1, 1965

- ◆ Zoning committee presents first set of Ordinances.
- ◆ Nivan Milligan appointed to be building inspector; salary to be \$5 from every permit issued.
- ◆ First zoning committee appointed:
 - Mrs. Woods
 - H. N. Milligan
 - L. M. Smith
 - Mannon C. Gore
 - Robert Sellars

February 1, 1966

- ◆ Volunteer fire department plans a cookbook fundraiser. Contact person: Lori Pearce.

April 1, 1966

- ◆ Open House for new Town Hall scheduled for April 15, 5 - 7 p.m.

April 7, 1966

- ◆ Town employs a college student as life guard; salary: \$125.00 for the season.

May 6, 1966

- ◆ Officer Joseph Adams hired as permanent employee with a 5% merit increase.
- ◆ Council rescinds ordinance prohibiting roller blading.

June 6, 1966

- ◆ Privilege tax approved not to exceed \$10 per year.
- ◆ Mr. Fayette Parramore, Jr. Sworn in as Town Clerk.

September 12, 1966

- ◆ General Fund balance: \$139.24
- ◆ Powell Funds balance: \$2,341.28
- ◆ Payment to attorney Frink and Ed Gore: \$125 + expenses.

December 5, 1966

- ◆ Motion to pay Police Chief Marvin Gray's salary (\$460.00) and expenses (\$75.00) for the period July 1, 1966 – October 31, 1966.

March 18, 1967

- ◆ Drew Long appointed Police Chief; salary to be determined.

April 3, 1967

- ◆ Taxes increased from 10¢ per \$100 to 30¢ per \$100 to raise money for trash collection.

May 30, 1967

- ◆ Taxes increased from 30¢ to 50¢ per \$100.



1967 - 1969

May 31, 1967

- ◆ Budget adopted: Total Expenses: \$2,709.95;
Expected Revenues: \$2,880.00

June 5, 1967

- ◆ Surfboards limited to the east end of the beach at least 1,000 feet from the pier.
- ◆ 50 Town auto license tags ordered: “Town of Sunset Beach – North Carolina’s Southernmost Beach”
 - Each motor vehicle up through ¾ ton trucks domiciled within Sunset Beach, is required to display a tag which costs \$2.00.

November 6, 1967

- ◆ Mrs. Jo Ann Simons appointed Town Clerk.

December 4, 1967

- ◆ Mayor will be paid \$10.00 per month for travel expenses retroactive to January 1, 1967.

May 7, 1968

- ◆ Council meetings are moved to Twin Lakes restaurant until further notice.

May 25, 1968

- ◆ Budget adopted: Total Expenses: \$4070.00; Expected Revenues: \$4397.00

October 7, 1968

- ◆ General discussion on obtaining a new bridge for Sunset Beach. Council directs its attorney to draw up a petition to the State Highway Department for said bridge.
- ◆ Planning Board established; five members appointed.

December 4, 1968

- ◆ Petitions regarding a new bridge ready to be sent to residents.

April 14, 1969

- ◆ Council sets salary and duties for Police Chief Long:
 - Salary: \$1,200 per year
 - Full-time Easter week through October
 - On call throughout the winter
 - \$100 for car expenses
- ◆ Town Clerk salary increased from \$400 to \$600.

July 7, 1969

- ◆ Copier purchased for \$29.95
- ◆ First signs erected on sides of Vesta Pier warning swimmers and surfers to stay 500 feet from the pier.
- ◆ Budget adopted for 1969-1970: \$8,770.00; Expected revenues: \$8,902.78

September 2, 1969

- ◆ First ABC Board appointed:
 - L. H. Parramore, Sr., Chairman, 3-year term
 - Nivan Milligan, 2-year term
 - Paul Brummett, 1-year term

November 1, 1969

- ◆ Berme & dune line ordinance adopted.



1969 - 1971

December 8, 1969

- ♦ Mason Anderson appointed Town attorney at an annual salary of \$400.

March 2, 1970

- ♦ David Kanoy hired to collect trash until June 1 at \$2.50 per hour.
- ♦ Helper hired from June 1 to September 8 at \$1.60 per hour.
- ♦ \$100 appropriated for cleaning the beach of debris left by winter storms.

March 26, 1970

- ♦ Norman Grisset appointed Chief of Police effective April 1.

April 6, 1970

- ♦ 8 garbage cans purchased at \$25 to replace those lost on the beach.
- ♦ Announcement: ABC store will open for business on Friday, April 10, 1980.
- ♦ Norman Grisset hired to operate the mosquito control project at \$2.00 per hour and \$2.00 per hour for rental of a truck or tractor.
- ♦ Vernie Hickman appointed Building Inspector.

May 4, 1970

- ♦ Mannon C. Gore allows police department to be housed in realty office of the Pavilion at no charge to the Town.
- ♦ Resolution: that fisherman, only, using beach buggies are allowed to park on the beach for fishing purposes only.
- ♦ Parking on the east end is becoming a menace and hindrance to normal traffic flow. Council instructs police to put up "no parking" signs and to barricade when necessary, roads unfit for traffic.

June 1, 1970

- ♦ First mobile home ordinance adopted.

June 29, 1970

- ♦ Tax rate increases to 70¢ per \$100.

January 11, 1971

- ♦ Ed Gore presents Town with a check in the amount of \$11,000 from Gore Corporation to be deposited in the berme-dune project.

February 1, 1971

- ♦ Ed Gore presents survey of land proposed for Town Hall. Mannon C. Gore donates 31 acres.

March 8, 1971

- ♦ Candidate's filing fee: \$10.00

May 1, 1971

- ♦ First Town Planning Board created.

June 7, 1971

- ♦ Resolution for lifeguard service from June 1 - September 6, 1971.

August 2, 1971

- ♦ Resolution adopted restricting any motor vehicles on the beach, including dune buggies, autos, trucks, and motorcycles. The fine for violation of not more than \$50 or imprisonment not to exceed 30 days by discretion of the court.



1971 - 1975

November 15, 1971

- ♦ Resolution to form Sunset Beach volunteer fire department.

April 20, 1972

- ♦ First police car to be purchased at a cost not to exceed \$1,600.

July 1972

- ♦ Credit card issued to police department.

August 1972

- ♦ Rufus Graham given permission to net fish from the beach for the full season.

September 1972

- ♦ Richard Edwards hired to be night policeman during the winter months at a salary of \$20 per month.

October 1972

- ♦ Ordinance: residents are required to have one (1) garbage can per bedroom.

March 1973

- ♦ Town Hall hours are extended to:
 - Monday 9-noon; Wednesday 2-5 p.m.; Friday 9-noon
- ♦ Permission granted to Ed Gore to pave 32nd and 33rd streets and Main Street to North Shore Drive at his own expense.

April 1973

- ♦ Ordinance adopted to prohibit dogs running loose on Sunset Beach.
- ♦ After receiving a letter from a visitor concerning parking problems, Council discusses inadequate parking facilities for the public.

April 1974

- ♦ Town Clerk salary increases to \$300 per annum.
- ♦ Sanitation employee's salary increased to \$2.50 per hour.

July 1, 1974

- ♦ Traffic violation fines established:
 - Improper parking: \$2.00
 - Running stop sign: \$3.00
 - Violation of dunes ordinance: \$5.00

June 2, 1975

- ♦ Calabash Lions Club wants to establish and maintain a roadside park on International Paper Company property.

July 7, 1975

- ♦ Council recommends purchase of new police car: \$5,000
- ♦ Citizen complaint regarding surfing and litter on the beach. Council questions the lifeguard as his contract said: "lifeguard picks up trash."

July 11, 1975

- ♦ Arthur Magill and L. D. Benton appointed to Planning Board.
- ♦ Clarice Holden appointed to Board of Elections.
- ♦ Petition presented for security lights at campground.



1975 - 1976

July 22, 1975

- ◆ Special meeting to discuss tax rate.
- ◆ Mayor Tucker “discovered by accident” that valuations proposed by County have been changed drastically. 3rd row lots values were decreased from \$9,500 to \$6,500; ABC lot decreased from \$20,000 to \$6,000.

August 4, 1975

- ◆ Patience Proctor appointed Chairman of Municipal Board of Elections.
- ◆ Police Chief questioned about reports of women’s bathing suits being torn.
- ◆ James Lewis appointed as 2nd police officer.
- ◆ Patience Proctor resigns as Chairman of Board of Elections.
- ◆ Council decides to allow Brunswick County to take over elections.

August 25, 1975

- ◆ Bathing suits continue to be ripped.
 - Culprit identified but lack of sufficient evidence for prosecution.
- ◆ Mrs. Patricia McKinney resigns as Town Clerk. She will continue as Building Inspector.
- ◆ Volunteer fire department presents Council with a 30-year contract signed by County Commissioners to provide fire protection within the fire district of Sunset Beach. The county agrees to pay the volunteer fire department \$5,000 per year for 30 years.
- ◆ Repurposed deed for a parcel of Town land on which fire station will be placed. Dimensions: 100 feet wide by 250 feet deep.

August 28, 1975

- ◆ Volunteer fire department has 27 active members, 2 inactive members; training continues.

November 3, 1975

- ◆ Town’s second policeman suspended because he owns a nightclub in Calabash that was raided.

December 1, 1975

- ◆ Shelton Tucker appointed Mayor. Ed Gore appointed Mayor Pro-Tem. New Council members seated: Ronald Holden and James Gordon.

December 3, 1975

- ◆ Special Called Meeting to hire night watchman.

January 1, 1976

- ◆ Special Called Meeting to fire night watchman because he doesn’t qualify for the job. Second person interviewed and will be hired as probationary police officer once his fingerprint reports are returned.

January 2, 1976

- ◆ Motion to allow traffic on the strand (beach) from September 10 to March 15. Speed limit to be 15 MPH. Pedestrians shall have the right-of- way.

May 3, 1976

- ◆ Beautification Committee requests \$500 donation.
- ◆ Entrance sign to Sunset Beach, for placement in median on Route 904, presented for approval.
- ◆ Council declines adoption of “no wake zone.”

June 7, 1976

- ◆ Police Officer Charles Walters resigns effective May 27.
- ◆ Council votes to hire a full-time employee for “general clean up;” 40 hours/week at \$3.50 per hour.



1977 - 1982

September 8, 1977

- ♦ Jim Jones, currently the part-time Internal Auditor, appointed finance officer. Jim's career with the Town ended on March 6, 2013 when he retired.

December 9, 1977

- ♦ Town accepts the following streets: 16th, 17th, and 18th.

March 6, 1978

- ♦ Building permit fee - \$10.00

April 5, 1979

- ♦ "No Wake" signs installed; difficult to enforce under current regulations.

February 6, 1979

- ♦ ATMC becomes telephone carrier.

September 10, 1979

- ♦ Town Clerk salary: \$9,000
- ♦ Public Works Foreman salary: \$9,750
- ♦ Sanitation Engineer salary: \$8,008

January 7, 1980

- ♦ Ordinance: a survey must be made before building permits are issued.

July 7, 1980

- ♦ Agreement with Atlantic Telephone Membership Corporation for community antenna television service.

August 4, 1980

- ♦ Employees begin participating in NC Government Employees Retirement System.

January 5, 1981

- ♦ Ordinance adopted: maximum number of bedrooms per structure in the beach residential district shall be 8.

April 6, 1981

- ♦ Fines for improper parking and running a stop sign increased from \$2 to \$5 per infraction.
- ♦ Dunes parking fine increased from \$5 to \$15.

February 1, 1982

- ♦ Michael Eisenberg appointed Town Attorney.

June 1, 1982

- ♦ General Fund checking account balance: \$473.91
- ♦ Revenue Sharing checking account balance: \$6.26
- ♦ Sunset Beach designated as *a seasonal growth center*.

June 28, 1982

- ♦ Public Works foreman advises stabilization of 16th and 19th streets where they seem to be washing away.
- ♦ Tax rate set at 28¢ per \$100.00.
- ♦ Police Department salaries & wages: \$35,493 for four officers.
- ♦ Volunteer fire department salaries & wages: \$3,500
- ♦ Zone MR-3 created for multi-family residential development.



1982 - 1984

September 15, 1982

- ◆ Council agrees to sell 1978 Plymouth police vehicle to highest bidder of \$300.95. Despite seeking a bid of \$500, allowed buyer to pay \$25 per week until paid in full.
- ◆ July water bill of Mr. Arthur Collins "was not received until August and postmarked August. He paid the late penalty of 80¢ in protest."

October 4, 1982

- ◆ Council votes not to refund the 80¢ late charge.
- ◆ Mayor and Council decline invitation to attend Oyster Festival parade.

October 11, 1982

- ◆ Mayor Kanoy introduces a resolution recognizing Mannon C. Gore as the *architectural father of the Town of Sunset Beach*, and pay tribute to him as a farmer citizen and developer of this unique community following his sudden death on October 8, 1982.
- ◆ Resolution passes calling upon the Department of Transportation to replace or improve the inadequate floating bridge and that this be brought to construction as expeditiously as possible.

December 6, 1982

- ◆ Oyster Bay golf links incorporated into Town.

January 3, 1983

- ◆ Ordinance requiring all houses in Town to display house numbers that are easily seen from the road.

June 1983

- ◆ NC Department of Transportation issues a statement concerning the replacement bridge over the inland waterway to Sunset Beach. Right-of-way scheduled for FY '84; construction scheduled for FY '85. Estimated cost: \$6.1 Million.
- ◆ Net fishing prohibited June through September.

December 5, 1983

- ◆ Employees granted a Christmas bonus of \$150 each.

June 4, 1984

- ◆ Mayor Kanoy appoints a committee to study the parking problem and see if a workable solution can be found. Committee members:
 - Town Administrator Wallace Martin
 - Donald Safrit, representing the Council
 - Warren Knapp, representing SBTA

June 25, 1984

- ◆ Council votes to install a traffic light at the bridge to regulate traffic.
- ◆ Report to study parking problems at Sunset Beach. "Any parking area developed at tax payers' expense at Sunset Beach will be full almost at once and the problems continue at an exasperated rate as the physical facilities of Sunset Beach are strained to handle the ever increasing crowds ... There is no guarantee that if you cross the bridge to enter Sunset Beach that you will find a place to park."
- ◆ A suggestion is made to give all citizens a pass that would allow them to park their cars at the Sunset Beach fishing pier.



1984 - 1986

December 3, 1984

- ◆ Police Chief requests that the police headquarters be moved into the Town shed.
- ◆ The Parking Committee adjourns its meeting "feeling that they had provided no solution to the problem of parking automobiles on the Island of Sunset Beach."
- ◆ Citizen input: a resident states that the parking committee has been talking for six months and are just spinning their wheels. Nothing has been done.

January 12, 1985

- ◆ A barge struck and knocked out a large section of the Sunset Beach Bridge.
 - Residents and visitors were stranded on the Island.
 - All emergency vehicles, equipment, and personnel were on the mainland.
 - The state responded quickly and worked in 12-hour shifts in cold weather.
 - A barge was brought in to remove vehicles from the island and shuttle boats provided by DOT transported individuals back and forth.

May 5, 1985

- ◆ Suggestion that parking on Main Street be discontinued except at the pier.
- ◆ Sea Trail requests annexation.

July 15, 1985

- ◆ Council sets tax rate at 28¢ per \$100.
- ◆ Budget set at \$227,820

August 29, 1985

- ◆ Town Council unanimously adopts resolution recommending that the DOT replace or improve the inadequate floating bridge as expeditiously as possible.
- ◆ Motion passes to rescind ordinance prohibiting parking on Main Street due to considerable consternation and divisiveness within Town; creates a parking committee to look at long range use of right-of-way and future concerns of parking in Town.

November 4, 1985

- ◆ Town accepts a gift of 35 acres of land on the west end of the beach from Ed Gore to use as a parking lot.

January 6, 1985

- ◆ Council appoints parking committee:
 - Hugh Munday ○ Zane Winters ○ Frank Auerbach
 - Channing Coppage ○ Minnie hunt ○ Al Morrison

March 3, 1986

- ◆ Council sets mowing fees for island lots: \$13 for one; \$17.25 for two.

1986 - 1988

April 7, 1986

- ◆ 16 Building Permits issued for single-family homes at market value of \$1,138,000.
- ◆ Red lights placed on either side of the bridge.
- ◆ Parking Committee recommendations:
 - Zone 35 acres at Mad Inlet for conservation & recreation in perpetuity.
 - Town should acquire 2nd and 3rd row lots for parking.
 - Town should utilize public property for parking:
 - 90-184 spaces on Main Street depending upon development.
 - 24-36 spaces on north/south streets – angled parking.
 - 20-45 spaces on Sunset Boulevard.
 - Leasing of property for parking:
 - 32 spaces in two back-to-back lots bordered by Canal & Main Streets.
 - 43 spaces in two lots at eastern end of island.
 - 24 angled spaces at west end of island on two lots.
 - 16 spaces on corner of 40th and Main second row lot.

May 5, 1986

- ◆ Council report: the red lights on the bridge operate on a timer. Whoever gets to the sensors on each side breaks the signal and the light turns green for that driver. The Highway Department is checking on the idea of having the Bridge Department turn the lights off from midnight through 6:00 a.m.

June 2, 1986

- ◆ 12.7¢ tax rate adopted
- ◆ Council votes to prohibit yard sales.
- ◆ Town Administrator Wallace Martin announces his resignation effective July 1, 1986.

July 7, 1986

- ◆ Council asks NC Bridge Department to stop boat traffic except on the hour rather than on demand as it has been.

July 7, 1986

- ◆ All permanent employees given \$200 bonus.
- ◆ Use of barbecues or charcoal restricted to owner of property or with written permission. All must be attended when lit.

February 2, 1987

- ◆ Sunset Boulevard extension, known as gazebo parking lot, deeded to Town as a gift from Twin Lakes, Inc.

March 2, 1987

- ◆ Taxpayers Association asks for matching funds for its beautification project.
- ◆ Tax rate set at 16.7¢ per \$100.

August 3, 1987

- ◆ Resolution requesting DOT to schedule hourly bridge openings April through October for the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. due to traffic back-ups.

September 14, 1987

- ◆ Town-wide street light plan adopted.

August 1, 1988

- ◆ Ordinance passes: \$5.00 permit required for yard and garage sales.



1989 - 1991

August 7, 1989

- ◆ Council votes to build a handicap walkway at 3rd Street.

September 12, 1989

- ◆ Unbeknownst to Town, the new Sea Trail development is tapping into Town water system.
- ◆ Engineer presents three parking plans for Sunset Boulevard. Council believes people would rather pay a fine than walk more than 150 yards to a parking space.

October 2, 1989

- ◆ Council sets 20 MPH speed limit on island streets, except state-owned roads which are set at 35 MPH.

November 6, 1989

- ◆ Council alerted to ordinance prohibiting disturbance of sand or vegetation beyond 125 feet from Main Street without Council permission. Linda Fluegel permitted movement of sand and bushes without alerting Council.

January 1, 1989

- ◆ Resolution: accommodation tax rate set at 3%.

December 4, 1989

- ◆ Council honors Minnie Hunt and Katherine Peed for service to Town.
- ◆ Hearing on closing portions of Dolphin, Cobia, Sailfish, and Marlin. First discussed in 1975 but final order was never completed.
- ◆ \$200 Christmas bonus approved for full-time employees.
- ◆ Mayor Barber states that in the future all public comments will be limited and agenda items not be considered as a public hearing.
- ◆ Council requests the State change the bridge light to blinking during January, February, and March.

February 15, 1990

- ◆ Announcement that DOT approved parking on Sunset Boulevard on a trial basis but to only pave half the street.

August 6, 1990

- ◆ Resolution passes to install traffic light at intersection of Routes 179 & 904 due to opening of Food Lion and congested traffic.

November 5, 1990

- ◆ Police Department implements *House Check* program for checking homes of absentee owners.

December 3, 1990

- ◆ Ordinance adopted making it unlawful for any person to alter, relocate, or disturb frontal dunes.

January 7, 1991

- ◆ Ordinance governing "public nudity" adopted.

July 8, 1991

- ◆ Council announces the opening of the 904 Recycling Center is scheduled for September.
- ◆ Council accepts voluntary annexation of Oyster Point I & II.

October 7, 1991

- ◆ Sea Trail annexed.



1991 - 1993

November 4, 1991

- ◆ Picture of Sunset Beach Bridge after the 1989 Christmas Eve snowstorm presented to be hung in Town Hall.
- ◆ Council meetings schedule changed to: 1st Monday of each month October through May at 7:00 p.m.; June through September at 7:30 p.m.

December 2, 1991

- ◆ Council approves \$200 Christmas bonus for full-time employees.

February 3, 1992

- ◆ Police Department receives \$2,700 grant for the Adopt-A-Cop program to purchase safety vests.
- ◆ Daniel Cordell hired as Building Inspector #1. Mr. Cordell built the gazebo on the beach.

April 6, 1992

- ◆ Janie Price, owner of Bird Island, would like to fulfill her husband's dream of building a house on the island and replacing the bridge that was burned several years ago.
- ◆ Resolution: Council encourages and supports any and all efforts by appropriate conservation groups or private non-profit corporations to acquire Bird Island for the purpose of maintaining it in its natural state as a conservation area.
- ◆ Citizen requests public bathrooms in the gazebo area. *This would be accomplished in 2012!*

July 1992

- ◆ Post Office renamed Sunset Beach Post Office.

September 19, 1992

- ◆ Beach Sweep report: 97 people participate; 62 bags of trash collected.

September 28, 1992

- ◆ Town accepts all roads owned by Colony Condominium Association.

February 1, 1993

- ◆ Beautification Committee presents Sunset Beach flag designed by its members. Council purchases 3x5 foot flag for \$235.

March 15, 1993

- ◆ Weekend storm requires securing the bridge and 100 cars were prevented from leaving the island for approximately 10 hours as the winds exceeded 30 MPH.
- ◆ Council approves "strong resolution" to DOT to speed up environmental study so it can build a new bridge.
- ◆ Proposed 1993-94 budget:
 - general fund: \$957,637
 - water fund: \$610,135
 - total budget: \$1,567,772
 - tax rate: 16.7¢ per \$100

July 5, 1993

- ◆ Police report: the volume of traffic over the 4th of July weekend was the most in the history of Sunset Beach.
- ◆ Discussion about the need for a new Town Hall.
- ◆ All areas within Town limits declared to be a sea turtle sanctuary.

August 23, 1993

- ◆ Absentee voting shall be permitted in all municipal elections.



1993 - 1997

- ◆ Ron Holden, Twin Lakes Restaurant owner, offers to allocate eight (8) parking spaces, designated by signs (at his expense), for pier parking if the Town will agree to allow the parking spaces in front of the restaurant to remain first-come, first-served parking.
 - Mr. Holden also agrees to change his current additional parking signs (at his expense), located on Canal Avenue and at the Highway 179 entrance of the Island Breeze parking area, to add pier parking.
 - Mr. Holden has contacted Senator Bill Rabon for assistance with opening the area under the bridge for parking.
 - Gary Parker and Mr. Holden met with Erik Christofferson, Wildlife Resources Commission (WRC), in an effort to gain access to the fenced areas under the bridge. Mr. Christofferson has contacted NC DOT and asked that it either move the fence or remove the fence completely to allow for additional parking.
- ◆ Council approves the following temporary solution to provide parking for the fishing pier:
 - Accept Mr. Holden's compromise to allocate eight (8) specific pier parking spaces distributed as five (5) spaces in the Island Breeze parking area and three (3) spaces in the Old Bridge parking area;
 - Allow first-come, first-served parking in the right-of-way in front of Twin Lakes restaurant;
 - Approach parking in this area as a long-range plan.
 - At its earliest convenience, designate a Work Session to discussion of the long-range parking plan. This should not occur until Council knows what Zoning Board members should be invited.
 - If possible, a DOT representative should be invited to provide guidance as to what can and cannot be done with a parking design for Sunset Boulevard from the foot of the Mannon C. Gore Bridge to the water.
